DFE News School Admission Requirements: Foreign Nationals

The CES have been asked by the DfE to circulate the information below.

'Information schools: Foreign nationals' rights: school admissions

The Department for Education continues to receive reports of a small number of schools refusing to admit foreign national children, including refugees and asylum seekers, or delaying admitting them whilst they seek immigration documentation.

This practice breaches admissions and equalities law.

Whilst they reside in the UK all children have a right to attend school, irrespective of their immigration status. We encourage you to review the guidance provided on <u>school</u> applications for foreign national children and children resident outside England.'

Whilst they are in England all parents are under a statutory duty (section 7 of the Education Act 1996) to ensure their children, if they are of compulsory school age, receive a suitable full-time education.

Their parents have a right to apply for a school, and school admission authorities are under a duty to comply with that preference unless 'prejudice' applies, as defined in section 86 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 (SSFA), and to comply with the rules about processing applications and not seeking unnecessary personal information set out within the School Admissions Code.

Also, under section 86 of the SSFA, LAs are under a duty to provide advice to all parents in their area on their preferences.

We have published information on our website that:

'Admission authorities for state-funded schools:

 must not refuse to admit a child on the basis of their nationality or immigration status nor remove them from the roll on this basis

- must not ask to see passports or other immigration information as a condition of admission (this would be a breach of paragraphs 1.9(a) and 2.8 of the <u>school</u> <u>admissions code</u>)
- with the exception of children who are Irish nationals, must not actively recruit foreign national children who are still resident overseas as pupils'

We continue to receive reports of some schools refusing to admit refugees and asylum seekers and some refusing to admit children until their parents provide immigration documentation. Separately, we have found, from time-to-time, a small number of others recruiting cohorts of students, living abroad, from the EEA to study in their sixth forms (which would, since Brexit, be in contravention of those students' visa/visitor rights and could lead to immigration enforcement action against them).

It is unlikely that every school will seek advice from the CES website before responding to applications from foreign nationals and so we would appreciate it if you could ensure that your schools – and other admission officers - are aware of school admission authority duties in respect of applications relating to such children."

DfE - First schools in England to offer free breakfast clubs announced. The government has confirmed the first 750 schools to offer the scheme, which will start in April and provide at least 30 minutes of free childcare before school **[GOV.UK]**.

The scheme has not been rolled out to all schools as yet,

Findings from a review of complaints made to the Department for Education about how independent appeal panels managed academies admissions appeals in the academic year 2024 to 2025.

The review provides advice on what steps clerks, panels and academy admission authorities can take to ensure admission appeal hearings comply with the <u>school</u> admission appeals code.

Absence - Almost a third of pupils refused to go to school in the past year, according to a new parent poll. The most common reasons cited were not enjoying school, mental health problems, having a special educational need or disability (SEND), and bullying [Tes Magazine - subscription required].

National offer day for secondary school places is approaching. Pupils due to start year 7 in September will find out about school places on Monday 3 March, with parents/carers having the right to appeal these decisions [BBC News].

Be clear on how to handle appeals and get details on how the full appeals process works.

Schools Complaints

<u>School complaints review calls as 80% of leaders abused</u> Over 80 per cent of school leaders have been abused by parents in the last year – with one in ten having been the victim of an assault, a new poll suggests, prompting calls to review complaints procedures.

Action needed on <u>"rising threat of violence"</u> in schools, says teachers' union NASUWT. Schools need a national multi-agency forum to improve safety and security, a teaching union has urged the government.

Whistleblowing - The governing board's role

The Governance Handbook 7.20 states that governing boards are responsible for agreeing and establishing a whistleblowing procedure that protects staff who disclose wrongdoing.

In practice, senior leaders in the school/trust are responsible for writing and implementing the procedure. In a multi academy trust (MAT), the procedure is likely to be trust-wide and approved and reviewed at trust board level. (Academies Handbook 2.40)

In local authority (LA) maintained schools, the procedure should be based on the LA's procedure.

Boards should ensure that all staff know:

- what protection is available to them if they make a disclosure
- what areas of malpractice or wrongdoing are covered in your whistleblowing procedure
- the different routes available for making a disclosure

FOUNDATION GOVERNORS - SPECIFIC CRITERIA

In respect of the school or college for which a person is or is to be a foundation governor, he or she must not at any time be:

- related to any member of the school or college staff, teaching, or non-teaching;
- related to any governor whether **elected**, **appointed**, or **ex-officio**, of the school;
- employed (whether as a teacher or otherwise) at the school.

A person (other than the parish priest) will not be re-appointed as a foundation governor of a particular school or college if he or she has just completed **three terms of office on that particular governing body.**

New Date tha: Effective Safeguarding in Practice Training, training for Governors and Directors

Schools have a statutory duty to safeguard and promote the welfare of all pupils.

Are all your governors up-to-date with their statutory responsibilities around safeguarding? The statutory guidance <u>Keeping Children Safe in Education</u> (KCSIE) places an obligation on all governors and trustees to receive appropriate safeguarding and child protection training at induction and to ensure that their training is regularly updated.

This popular workshop will run as a webinar and cover all the essential information you need to understand your statutory responsibilities.

It is so important that all governors are aware of their responsibilities for child protection and safeguarding. This is especially relevant for new governors as part of their induction and governors with a lead for monitoring safeguarding in their school.
